Headline: Meeting of the Waters, Meeting of the Minds in Goolwa

**Standfirst:** Scientists, community, and the Ngarrindjeri Nation come together to exchange knowledge and ideas on managing and preserving the internationally recognised and culturally significant Coorong, Lower Lakes and Murray Mouth region.

**05 March 2025:** Last week, scientists, First Nations and community gathered at the CLLMM (Coorong Lower Lakes Murray Mouth) Research Centre in Goolwa for a Research Networking Day. The event provided an opportunity for teams delivering Research Centre projects to share their knowledge, discuss ongoing projects, and identify future needs for the Coorong region.

Rebekha Sharkie MP officially opened the Research Networking Day, highlighting the crucial role of CLLMM Research Centre and the voices of the community in advancing knowledge of the region.

"We need more science, we need more scientists in Parliament House," she said.

The CLLMM Research Centre is delivering the largest research collaboration to ever focus on the Coorong, Lower Lakes and Murray Mouth region. With 25 research projects currently underway, from examining freshwater soaks in the Coorong, barrage technology as it nears its centenary of operation, local and migratory birdlife, changing water levels and how local communities can adapt to worsening drought and floods in this region To deliver these projects, the CLLMM Research Centre is bringing together more than 130 project team members consisting of scientists from South Australia's three universities, Ngarrindjeri Aboriginal Corporation, Burrandies Aboriginal Corporation, local community organisations, and private and NGO sectors.

Dr Nick Whiterod, Science Program Manager of the CLLMM Research Centre, highlighted the contributions of independent scientific advice, First Nations knowledge and community activity to the Centre's understanding of climate change impacts.

"The Research Centre has created a platform for scientists, community and First Nations to work together to better understand how to respond to, and prepare for, the challenges facing the region now, in 10, or 100 years," he said.

He added "Getting project teams in the same room for the Research Networking Day was an important step to get them all on the same page.
